On April 25th, the Valley of Wilmington will be presenting a live performance of the 19th degree. This degree is called the **Brother of the Trail**. It is performed with 1 active actor. The setting for this degree is the American West in the 1840's and 1850's, along the famed Oregon Trail at a place called Register Cliff. It is not too far, as Western distances go, from the present town of Guernsey, Wyoming. Register Cliff still stands in testimony to the spirit of the pioneers who traveled the Trail and used their knives or anything of metal on Register Cliff's 100-foot vertical wall of sandstone in order to create almost permanent graffiti to let the world know they had made it thus far toward a new life, or at least these many miles away from their old one.

Imagine a sheer sandstone wall rising 100 feet from the floor of a valley carved by the now usually tame, nearby North Platte River. It is summer on the Oregon Trail, and the great prairie is starting to pale its color from the heat and lack of rain. The ribbon of land around the river is a vibrant green in comparison, and a smooth intensity of lush color contrasted to the rough crags and brown hues of the sandstone wall which rises above it. That vibrant green is a harbor beacon for prairie schooners seen from across miles of prairie grass waves. A night away by horseback from the security of the US Army's Fort Laramie, the "Oregon Trailers" would be grateful for the crystal clear water from melting snows off mountains which are only distant baby teeth on the smooth, distant horizon. Here at Register Cliff there is grazing pasture and clean water, both welcomed by any traveler on this trail. Here it is even possible to sometimes catch a fish.

We are very fortunate to have Brother Oscar Alleyne, from the valley of Hudson, N.Y.. Oscar last performed for our valley during our 100th year celebration on October 20, 2012. Below is a brief biography of brother Oscar Alleyne,32°. He is currently the Worshipful Master of Wappingers Lodge No.671 and the Commander in Chief of the Valley of the Hudson, NY, AASR NMJ. He was the charter Sovereign Master of the Allied Masonic Degrees, Kmt Council No.511 and serves as the Grand Superintendent for the State of New York of the Grand Council of the Allied Masonic Degrees USA. He lectures frequently on historical, philosophical, leadership and other topics of Masonic interest and is a member of several Masonic research bodies.

He holds a Doctorate from the New York Medical College and is a graduate of the University at Albany, School of Public Health where he was awarded membership in the Delta Omega Honor Society in recognition of his contribution to public health. He is the Director of Epidemiology and Public Health Planning for the Rockland County Department of Health and serves on a number of national boards and workgroups on Bio surveillance, Epidemiology, Policy and Public Health.





Scottish Rite is Off To Gettysburg - August 15th

Battle Summary: The Battle of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania (July 1–July 3, 1863), was the largest battle of the <u>American Civil War</u>, as well as the largest battle ever fought in North America, involving around 85,000 men in the Union's Army of the Potomac under Major General George Gordon Meade and approximately 75,000 in the Confederacy's Army of Northern Virginia, commanded by General Robert Edward Lee. Casualties at Gettysburg totaled 23,049 for the Union (3,155 dead, 14,529 wounded, 5,365 missing). Confederate casualties were 28,063 (3,903 dead, 18,735 injured, and 5,425 missing), more than a third of Lee's army.

Notable Facts about the Battle of Gettysburg

Ammunition at Gettysburg: An estimated 569 tons of ammunition was fired during the three days of fighting. Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address was delivered November 19, 1863, at the dedication of the "Soldiers' National Cemetery" at Gettysburg. The speech was extremely short by the standards of the day and received scant notice at the time, but its concise, powerful wording has made it one of the best-known public addresses in all of history. Contrary to popular myth, Lincoln did not scribble the speech on the back of an envelope on his way to Gettysburg but wrote several drafts. The last bodies would not be retrieved from battlefield graves and reinterred in the cemetery until months after the dedication ceremonies.

John Buford, whose cavalry fired the first shots of the battle, died December 16, 1863. His death is thought to have resulted from typhoid fever and a body weakened by exhaustion. He received a deathbed promotion to major general, post-dated to July 1, 1863.

Civilians at Gettysburg were left to deal with the thousands of wounded. Homes and public buildings became hospitals, and diseases born of infection and unsanitary conditions made living in the town risky. Volunteers came from the North and the South, however, to aid in caring for the wounded, burying the dead, and piling and burning carcasses of horses and mules killed in the fighting.

During the battle, a random bullet went through the door of a house, striking and killing 20-year-old Mary Virginia (Jenny) Wade. She was the only civilian killed during the battle.


Donations may be made by members at any time or via dues payments, by notating the amount in excess of dues owed annual appeals, bequests and other gifts.

Donate with your dues payment

Annual dues notices to members of the Valley of Wilmington are mailed out in August. In addition to indicating dues owed (if any), the payment form includes a line to indicate Almoner's Fund donation -- consider writing in whatever amount you can afford!

Donate using a credit or debit card

Should you wish to charge your donation separately from your dues payment to a credit or debit card, our administrative office has the ability to process payment over the phone; please call (302) 998-6475 for assistance.

If paying dues online by credit card through the Supreme Council's Member Center website, you may include an Almoner's Fund donation to your Valley, but the system requires that dues payment be processed prior to any charitable donation.

Also, the annual Almoner's Appeal includes a payment form that accepts credit/debit card information.

Donate during the Almoner's Appeal

Each year in December, the Almoner's Fund from Lexington sends a letter to all members of Scottish Rite encouraging them to consider making a donation. This mailing arrives in a colored envelope (blue, yellow, etc.) and includes a reply card to indicate donation amount and credit card information (for those selecting that option), plus a return envelope.
